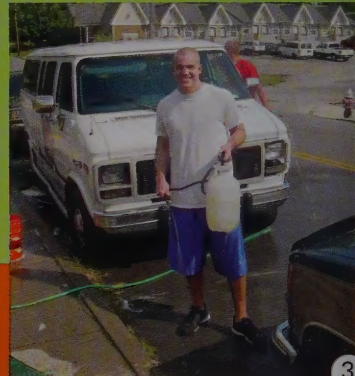

The Lipscomb Initiative for Education (LIFE) program allows inmates at the Tennessee women's prison to take classes through the university. Each week the inmates study with university students in a class taught by a Lipscomb professor at the prison. The Tennessee Department of Corrections wants to provide opportunities for members of that community to improve their lives so they leave the prison better prepared to assume productive roles in

society. Lipscomb University is helping accomplish that initiative by offering these classes. Dr. Randy Lowry, president of Lipscomb University, attended and spoke at the GED graduation ceremony for the inmates. Attendees were students who had completed their GED or other vocational programs and included students who participated in college level coursework offered by Lipscomb University.

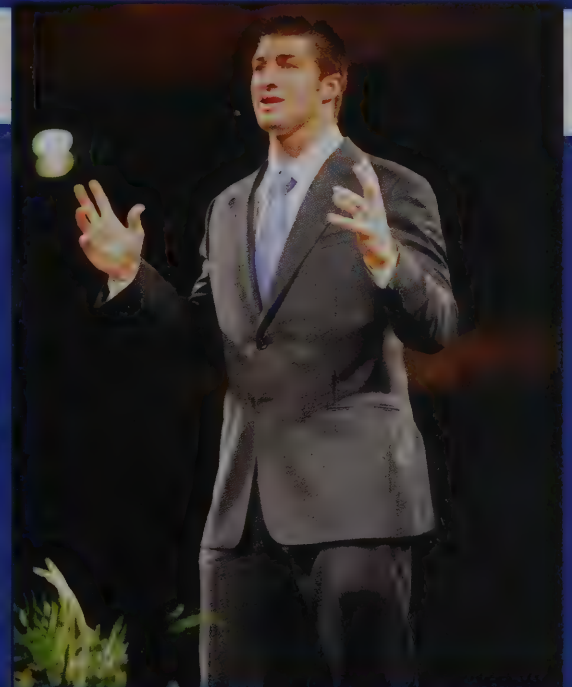

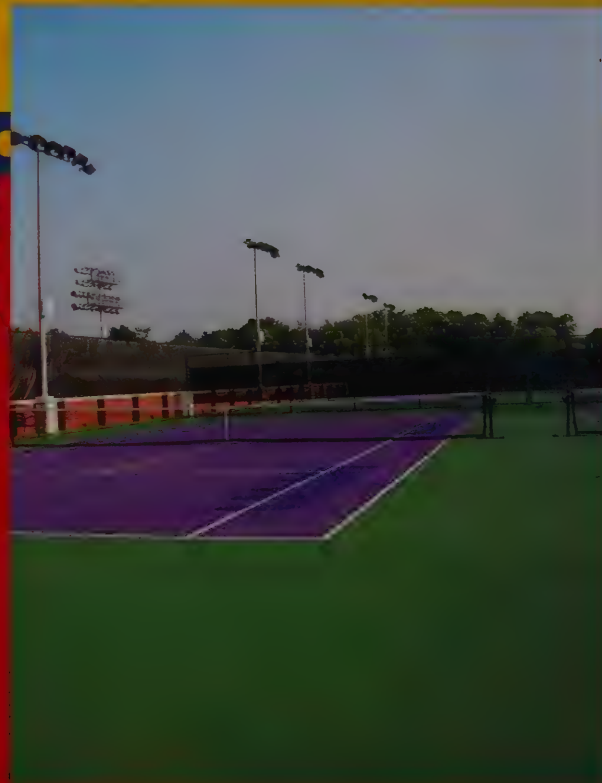

One of the major additions to the Lipscomb University campus is the Huston-Marsh-Griffith tennis center on top of the Allen Arena West Parking Garage. While the new garage attempted to relieve the shortage of student and visitor parking, the tennis center provided much needed tennis courts for the Lipscomb University tennis team. Along with the center comes the Lipscomb Racquet Club and a brand new pro retail shop. The Racquet club has a partnership with the local YMCA, allowing members to play at a discount.

Another addition to the campus is the James D. Hughes Center, an art and engineering building. The Hughes Center

will include an art gallery, photography darkroom, ceramics studio, painting studio, drawing studio, printmaking studio, graphic design lab, sculpture studio, and a mixed media studio. A robotics and renewable energy lab will also be in the building for use of the College of Engineering students.

Students and visitors will also notice the matching green signs located throughout campus. While a seemingly small addition compared to the two new buildings,

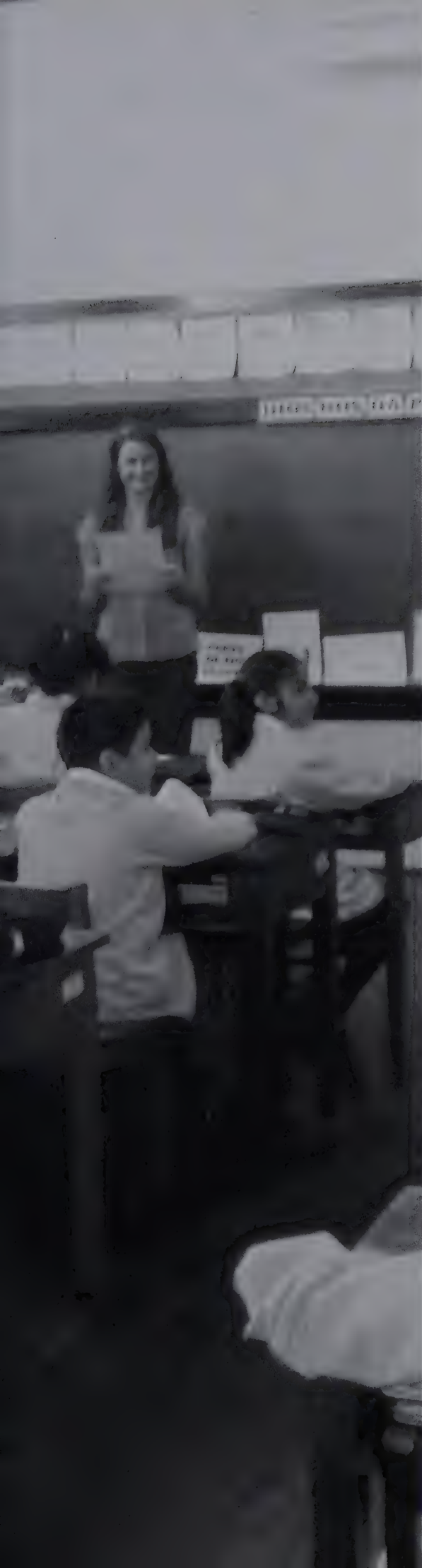
the signs contain campus maps and will provide visitors with a guide to navigate their way around campus.

What was your vision for yourself when first starting college?

I envisioned a life of service, being faithful to God, marrying a Godly man, raising a family, and being a professional social worker. I hoped return to Lipscomb someday to teach after I had worked in the field. Most of all, I wanted, when my life on this earth was over, for people to say, "She touched my life and heart for God," and for God to say, "Well done, good and faithful servant...Welcome Home."

Where are you today?

I am married to a wonderful Godly man and am the mother of a wonderful Godly son. I spent 13 years being a Christian social worker, and am in my 16th year at Lipscomb teaching others to be Christian social workers. I have a Master of Science in Social Work, the terminal degree for practice in the field. I also have a Doctorate of Education in Leadership and Professional Practice.

I worship at the Crieve Hall church of Christ, where I teach ladies classes and mentor younger women. I love to sew and enjoy doing that for some specific children – at church and in the community. When I was young, a special woman sewed to give me special things; I "pay it forward" by doing the same thing for other little ones today.

What is your vision for the future of Lipscomb University?

My vision for Lipscomb is for it to "turn the world upside down" in a way consistent with first century Christianity. I envision the campus as a place distinctly different in both character and practice – in the name of God rather than worldly acclaim.

Tell us a story.

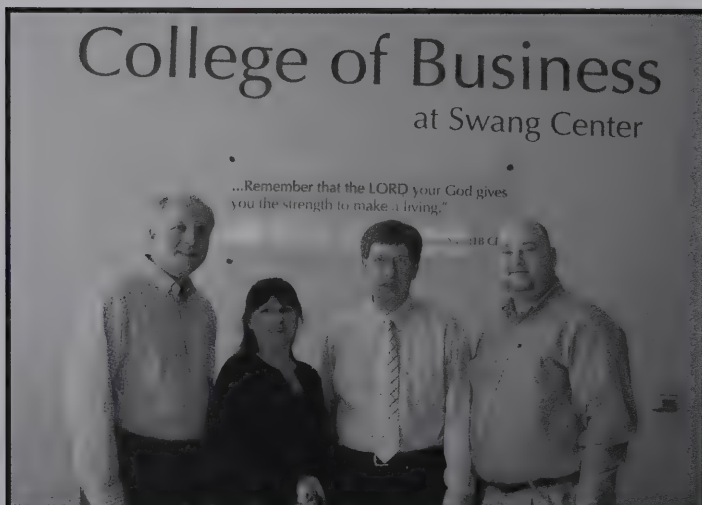
My first acquaintance with LU came when I was 10 or 11 and came with a lady from church for a "high school night" at what was then called David Lipscomb College. Living in an east Nashville housing project at the time, I had never seen a formal ball game, public cafeteria, a college dormitory, or the side of Nashville on this side of the Cumberland River. I was totally amazed at the idea that there was a place where so many people loved God and loved learning as much as I did. Once I'd been here, my heart never left. It became my life's dream to attend Lipscomb – to be the first person in my family to graduate college and to do it in a Christian school where I could go to chapel and have a Bible class everyday.

Years later, I was blessed with scholarships and grants to come as a student. I was taught by an amazing social worker who I later learned had served my own family when I was a baby. She saw the fruit of her labor, and we both shared the joy of my graduation, my professional career in public welfare, and my return to assume her position as she retired from Lipscomb. She could not have known when she served a struggling family that the baby of that family would grow up and later come back to bless her...to sit at her feet and learn, to carry her passion back into the field and shape the public welfare systems of two states, and then to return and work alongside her in teaching generations of students to do the same.

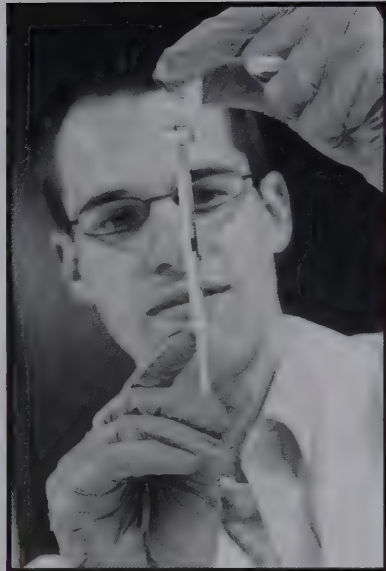

What was your vision for yourself when first starting college?

I knew by the fall of my freshmen year in college that I was going to be an art history professor. I had quite an inspiring professor in art history, who, through her teaching and leadership in the department, convinced me to drop my Arts Administration degree and concentrate fully on art history. I was uncertain at that time as to how I might attain that goal but determined to do it. And I did.

Where are you today?

One of my greatest passions about art history is continually discovering it over and over again, in new ways and from different perspectives. I am currently researching and writing about 21st pedagogy for art history courses, about narratology in art history, and about the artist, Richard Tuttle. I also serve on the advisory board for the LIFE program here at the university and I have taught two courses at the Tennessee Prison for Women in the past two years. That has been a wonderful program—not only for the traditional Lipscomb students and the female inmates who have become Lipscomb students but also for me as a professor and a scholar. Those classes really made me think differently about how I taught and what I taught. And, I am certainly the better for it. It has even led me to do some scholarly work on higher education and service-learning in the prisons.

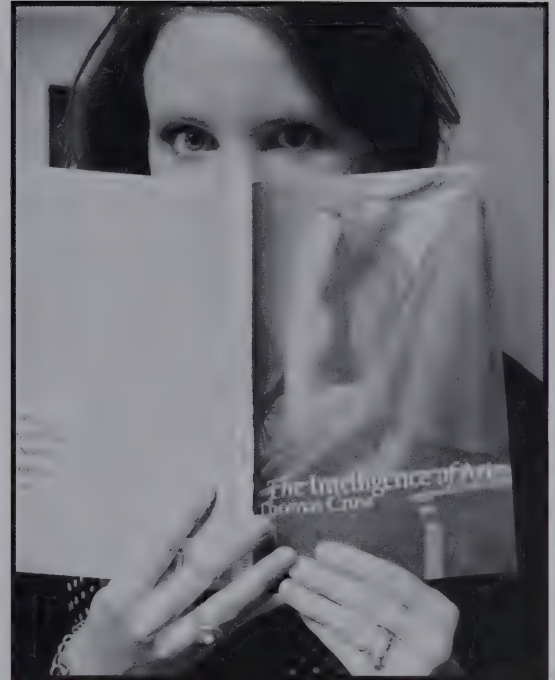
What is your vision for the future of Lipscomb University?

I think Lipscomb is an exciting place to be now. As chair of the Department of Art, I often see Lipscomb through that lens of art and art history. We have worked diligently in this department to cultivate the Nashville art community and to be a place where people in the city now come to see and learn about art. The unique Presidential Lectureships for Art and Art History and the Visiting Artist Program have been wildly successful and have helped to position us as an innovative and vital academic department in the discourse of art in Middle Tennessee.

Tell us a story.

No story to give. But here's some advice.

Do what you love and don't worry about money. If you are passionate and sincere in your profession and about your work, you will find a way to pay the bills. It worked for me and I cannot imagine doing anything else that I would love more than being with my students and my colleagues here.

What was your vision for yourself when first starting college?

When I first entered college, I was like many freshmen and didn't have a clue what I wanted to do professionally. I grew up in Southern California without many Christian friends, so when I began looking for a college to attend, I wanted to go to a place that would foster academic and spiritual growth. I chose Harding University in Searcy, AR, and was excited to be attending a school that emphasized Christian Education. I enjoyed being with friends who valued the same things I did in life. It was a real blessing to have the opportunity to grow academically, socially and spiritually. I competed in cross country and track while at Harding and developed some very close and rewarding friendships during those years. I did end up majoring in English and actually taught two years of high school English in

Arizona before returning to school and changing careers. Because of my interest in running and my athletic background, I decided to pursue a master's degree in Exercise Physiology at the University of Arizona. Since my academic background was in English, I had to take a year of pre-requisite courses prior to getting into the graduate program. I finished the degree and was offered a job in Mississippi working for a hospital directing a Wellness Program and eventually came to Lipscomb to coach cross country/track and teach in the Kinesiology Department. I took a rather circuitous route to get to where I am today but feel blessed by all the people and experiences God put in

my life along the way.

Where are you today?

My responsibilities at Lipscomb today include holding the academic rank of Professor in Exercise Science and teaching in the Department of Kinesiology; serving as the Kinesiology Department Chair (since 1993); working with the Athletic Department as the Faculty Athletics Representative-FAR (since 1997); and Co-Directing the newly established graduate program in Exercise and Nutrition Science and teaching graduate courses in that program. Outside of Lipscomb, we enjoy traveling, hiking and backpacking. We attend the Antioch Church of Christ where I serve as an elder (since 2001). Antioch has a unique vision of serving those in that community and it is very rewarding to see our members get excited with the work we are doing. This past summer (2009), my wife and I worked with Wilderness Trek Christian Camp in Colorado cooking banquet meals for those participating in that ministry. We hope to be involved with TREK again this coming summer (2010). We have 2 grown children (Russell and Randi who graduated from Lipscomb) and

Ryan who attends Harding.

What is your vision for the future of Lipscomb University?

I believe Lipscomb has a great future as we continue helping students grow academically, socially and spiritually. The primary mission of Lipscomb is to integrate Christian faith and practice with academic excellence. The mission is carried out not only in the classroom but also by involvement in numerous services to the church and the larger community.

What a blessing to teach at a place where the vision is broader than helping students grow academically.

Tell us a story.

I don't really have a particular story to tell (I'm sure my students have plenty, however). I guess one thing I would like to communicate to students is be open to God's leading and direction. Sometime He provides opportunities we don't see or don't recognize. If I look at my own life, I came to Lipscomb after stints in California, Arkansas, Arizona, Mississippi and finally, Tennessee. I was about 33 years old before settling into my career. One of my favorite passages in scripture comes from Hebrews 12:1-3 where the author reminds us to "keep our eyes on Jesus." If I can

just remember to do that one thing, it really doesn't matter what I end up doing in life or where I live. God will welcome me home.

What was your vision for yourself when first starting college?

I was very interested in the business side of the broadcasting industry. The production of successful radio and television programming was very intriguing since I had grown up in a time when the broadcast industry had changed so dramatically from a technological perspective and had brought so much of the world into our homes—both the good and the ugly. We witnessed the space race that culminated in the moon landings, watched a war, saw leaders assassinated. And all of this changed from black-and-white to living color before our eyes. Radio brought a new and wonderful new sound to our lives with groups like the Beatles and performers like Eric Clapton. Radio was my primary lifeline to Alabama football before most games were televised. And so I wanted to be part of all this and got my undergraduate degree in broadcast and film communication with a minor in marketing. The marketing courses fascinated me and I decided to get my MBA with a marketing concentration. After working for a time with a radio station and in department store retailing, I got an opportunity to come to what was then David Lipscomb University to teach marketing classes and help establish the marketing major. I've been associated with Lipscomb ever since.

Where are you today?

Today I hold three degrees, all from the University of Alabama—a BA undergraduate degree and a MBA and Ph.D. In addition to teaching classes I have chaired the Department of Marketing for a number of years. My primary involvement beyond school has been activities at the churches where I've had my membership over the years. For many years I was a member at the Natchez Trace Church of Christ where I was a teacher of an adult class and, for several years, oversaw the operation of the Natchez Trace Church of Christ Hospitality House, a facility that provide cost-free lodging for folks who have loved ones in area hospitals and who don't have relative or friends in Nashville with whom to stay and cannot afford lodging at a hotel or motel. I am currently a member of the West End Church of Christ where I teach an adult class and, until recently, chaired the board of directors for the Christian Children's Center, a pre-school operated by the church for over 50 years. My wife and I have become active in leading DivorceCare and GriefShare seminars to assist people struggling with those traumatic life events. I enjoy attending academic conferences and making presentations at those. When the opportunity arises, I enjoy speaking and other opportunities to talk about marketing to professional groups and organizations. Examples would include organizations such as the Society for the Marketing of Professional Services and AGAPE. I am married (Lori) and have two children (Lauren and Sterling). I am still a devout supporter of the Crimson Tide football team and enjoy attending concerts by classic rock and roll artists such as Eric Clapton. I drive a 1965 Mustang that I'm finally so ashamed of that I'm beginning to restore it. My favorite place to be other than home is on a beach.

What is your vision for the future of Lipscomb University?

Lipscomb has come so far since I came here in 1981. The school has, in many ways, grown up and joined the greater communities of academic institutions and societal activities. I believe this trend is going to continue and the Lipscomb name will become know farther and wider than ever and will mean more things to more people than in days past. A day is coming when people everywhere will recognize the Lipscomb name and will know what it stands for and what we do here.

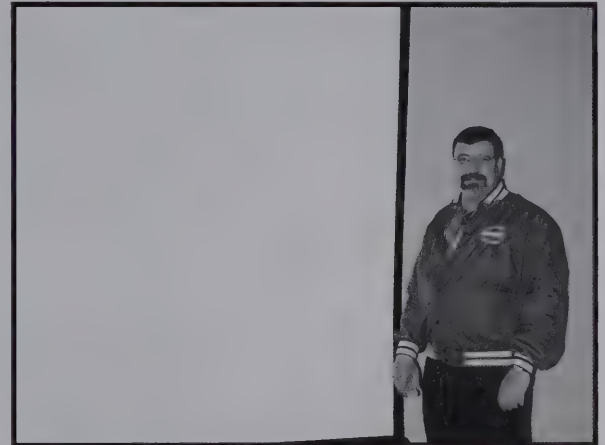
As the school grows in numbers, programs, and in other ways, my greatest wish is that we would develop a wonderful sense of community and that students would have an even greater appreciation for the Lipscomb heritage and feel an enhanced sense of pride in being a Lipscomb student and, later, alum. I dream of a time when those who have graduated will return in overwhelming numbers for all kinds of campus events and who will contribute their time and talents and money to increase the value of the Lipscomb degree they already have and to help those who are following in their footsteps achieve the same goal the alums have already achieved.

Tell us a story.

Beyond a place to work, I came to Lipscomb to pursue a love interest. I thought I'd found a till-death-do-you-part person back home and when she came here, I followed. Well, that didn't work out. However, I did find love here. I've got great

colleagues in the College of Business that have been wonderful friends and who have supported me in good times and bad. Across the campus I've fallen in love with others who were and are great people in so many ways. Some are still here, like Dr. Harvey Floyd. Others are not, like Dr. Ralph Nance, Dr. Gary Fulks, and Nane Roberts—folks I did love until we were parted by death. I've known giants in their various areas, like Dr. Axel Swang, who loved and practiced accounting and taught generations of accountants. I knew Ken Dugan who coached great baseball teams and helped young men be better on the field and in life. I think the best lesson I've learned from all this and that I'd pass on to folks about to graduate and start life is that you need to find a place to work that has people who will build you up as a person, people with whom you can form real relationships. You might not end up with as much money in your 401k, but you'll have another kind of treasure that is priceless.

Here's a somewhat humorous story. On the first day I parked on campus in 1981 as a new faculty member I got out of my 1965 Mustang and heard someone shout at me that I couldn't park in that spot since it was a faculty spot. The person who shouted at me was a person who worked in security at that time. I told him I was a faculty member and he then said it was OK for me to park there. About twenty years later he asked me if I remembered that incident and I said yes. He told me he didn't believe me that day and checked up on me to see if I was, in fact, a faculty member. At that time I looked more like a student than a faculty member. I still have that car and I'm restoring it to look much like it did on that day in 1981. However, I don't expect anyone will ever tell me I can't park in a faculty spot again because I look like a student. If only it was as easy to improve my appearance as it is a car's appearance! Then again, is a person's appearance that important? Some things in life are worth hanging on to and investing time, money, and effort to preserve and improve. My Mustang is one of those things. My personal appearance? Well, that's another issue as far as what can be done and whether or not it's an important thing to do.

What was your vision for yourself when first starting college?

Tell us a story.

The story that comes to mind happened on the first day I taught at Lipscomb. I had previous teaching experience, but had been away from the classroom for several years. One of the courses I was assigned was "Microprocessors," a class I had never taught before. Also, I had never taught at a Christian school before, and was a little unsure of just how things would go. After introducing myself to the students, and outlining what we would cover and what I expected from them, one student was especially enthusiastic about the course, stating "Dr. Nordstrom, I've been waiting three years for this course! This class is the reason I choose engineering!" No pressure! But his energy and enthusiasm was infectious, inspiring not only me but the entire class. We learned a tremendous amount that semester, and those energetic and gracious students taught me what a joy it is to be a faculty member at Lipscomb. I often reflect on how providential that first semester was in "welcoming me" to Lipscomb, and am truly grateful to that group of students for their kindness and understanding.

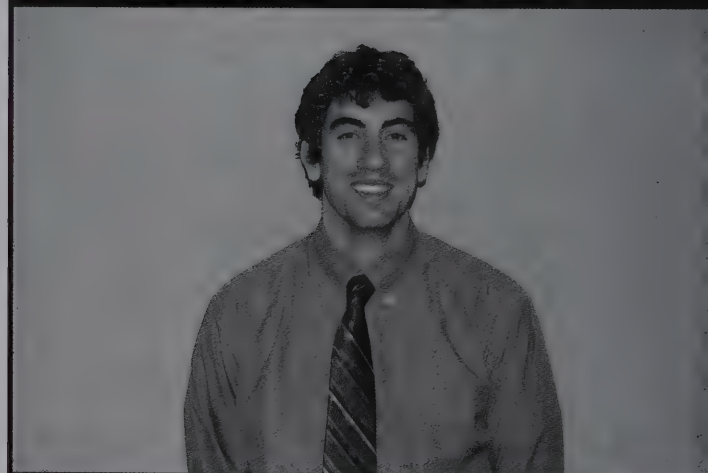

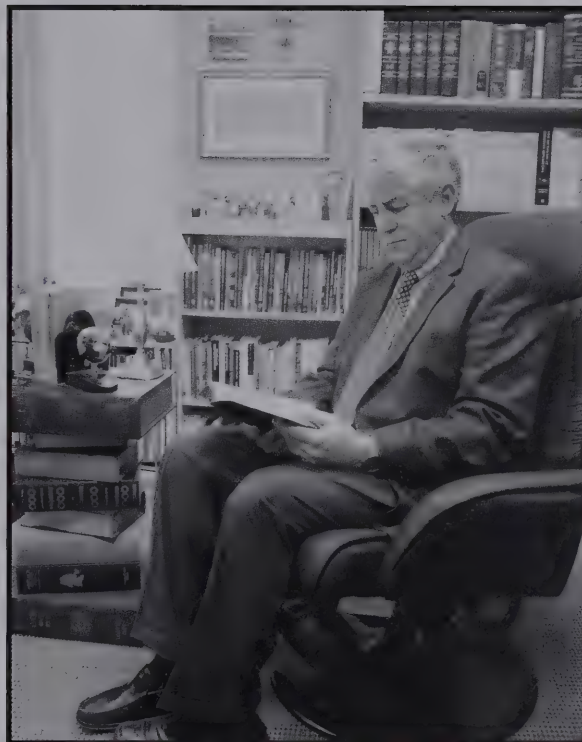

She moved to China in 1975 after graduating from Lipscomb in June of 1951. She and her husband, John Liu, were married in the lobby of Johnson Hall in August, 1951. They lived in Indiana until China opened to Westerners. They then moved to Beijing where John became very successful in business and Eleanor, who has now just turned 90 years old, still swims daily and teaches English classes. She stays in touch with the network of Lipscomb friends she has around the world. I believe there are more than 30,000 Lipscomb alums worldwide and we just happened to sit down at a church in Beijing, China next to one. But what a great family we are all a part of, thanks to our relationship to each other through Christ and through Lipscomb.

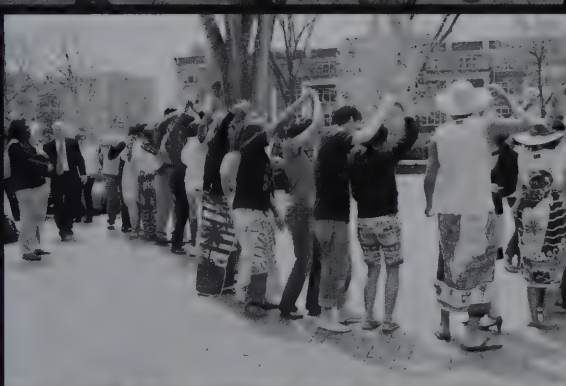

What was your vision for yourself when first starting college?

When I graduated from Lipscomb with an accounting major, I had strong encouragement from Dr. Swang to get a graduate degree. It was my desire to pursue a professional career in public accounting with a large accounting firm. My first four years after college were spent with a large accounting firm in Huntsville, Alabama. At no time during my college years or during my early professional life did I consider teaching as a career. However, after teaching as an adjunct at the University of Alabama - Huntsville, I had such a wonderful experience, that I decided to pursue teaching as a life-long career. I was most fortunate that a position at Lipscomb soon became available and was able to begin my teaching career in 1971.

My joy of teaching comes from the many wonderful relationships that are formed and the fact that you feel you are making a difference in someone's life, and, at the same time, students are making a difference in the teacher's life.

When entering the academic profession, my vision was to provide students with the tools necessary for a successful professional and personal life. I desire that my students achieve success in the professional world, but even more important, that they achieve success in their personal relationships with God and with others. If these two relationships carry their primary focus, then success in a professional career would be a great by-product.

As I began my teaching career, I also had the fortunate opportunity to render outside consulting services to business clients. These outside experiences allowed me to share the practical side of accounting and tax consulting with students.

Where are you today?

I remember:

- Athens Clay Pullias as President of Lipscomb and how he asked all faculty to give up two or three days of their Christmas vacation to contact businesses to raise funds for the school
- Batsell Barrett Baxter and his warm gentle spirit
- Brother Collins and his many intentional and unintentional quips
 - o To alleviate a shortage of parking on campus, he said he and Ruth Gleaves "would stop parking on campus."
 - o To encourage a larger Lipscomb enrollment, he encouraged students to "have fun, get married, have more babies."
- The wonderful chapel talks given by Ira North, minister of the Madison Church

- Chapel talks by students who seemed to compete for the most unique talk:
 - o One student came to the podium and said he had forgotten his speech, that he was unprepared and could not give his talk, then he sat down; after several seconds, he got back up and gave his talk on "Being Prepared in Life."

- o Another student, or a guest (I was never sure), claimed he was a famous Nashville music promoter, had arrived in a chauffeured limousine, and was giving Lipscomb \$1,000,000 in student scholarships; after the loud applause died down, he denied all three things and said he did it because he thought students would listen to his talk only if they thought he was someone famous; then he spoke about over-emphasis on position and possessions.

- Dr. Swang and the great influence he had on my life
- Dr. Swang yelling at baseball ballgames, to such an extent that I could not sit close to him

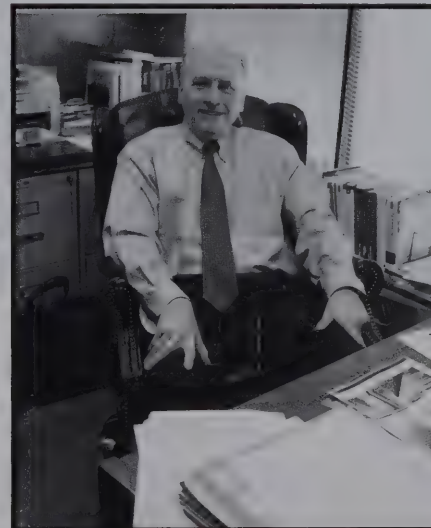
- The graduation when a student had mechanically caused the tune to Looney Tunes to play over the P.A. system as graduation ended and the students were walking out of the auditorium; Dr. Pullias seemed upset as he marched out

- The class when the business law teacher opened a book on the podium to see who owned the book, and a cup of flour, triggered by a spring, flew out from inside the book and covered the teacher in flour.

- When Dr. Bill Ingram was surprised by his students on his birthday, with the arrival of a belly dancer in his classroom, and then Dr. Swang (fighting through a swarm of students who had arrived at the door of the classroom) to escort her from campus.

- I remember driving with Bill Ingram and others, all day Saturday, to St. Joe, Missouri to watch our baseball team defeat Southeastern Oklahoma to win the national NAIA championship, then getting in the car at 10:00 pm and driving back to Nashville - a great road trip!

- I remember Coach Don Meyer arriving on the Lipscomb campus and how, in his first year as coach, he played a very "slow-down" type of game when the final score was usually something like 32 - 28, which was a horrible game to watch. Later as he recruited a different type of player, he became one of the most popular coaches in the NAIA division, if not throughout the country.

Where are you today?

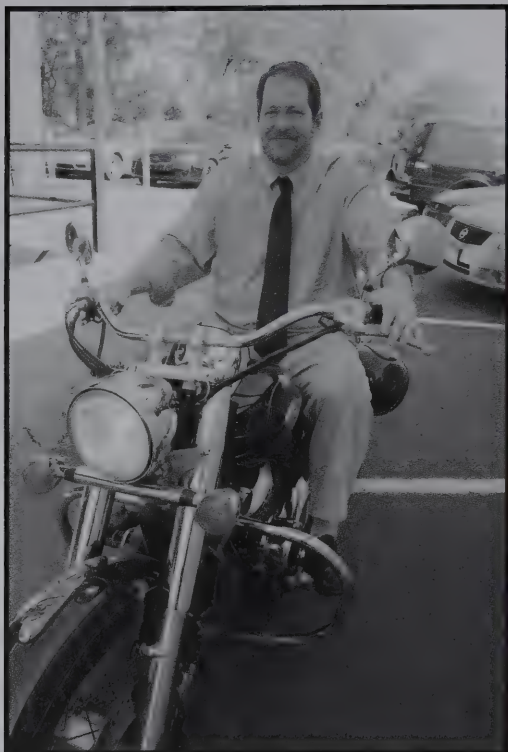

Where are you today?

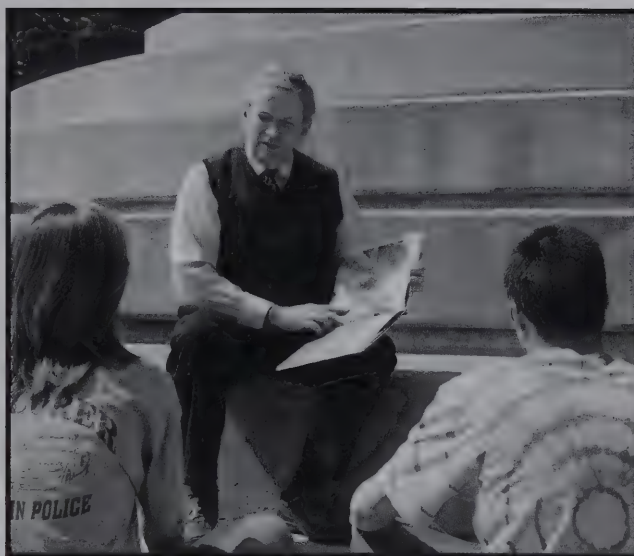

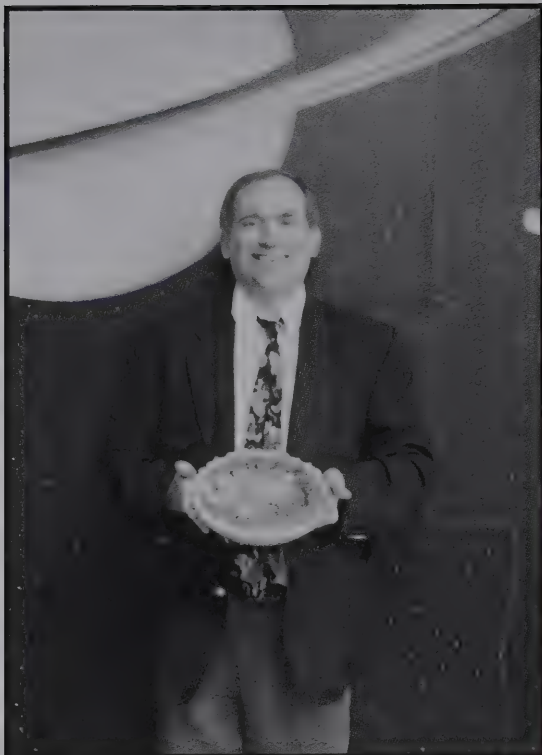

This may be sort of depressing, but here goes:

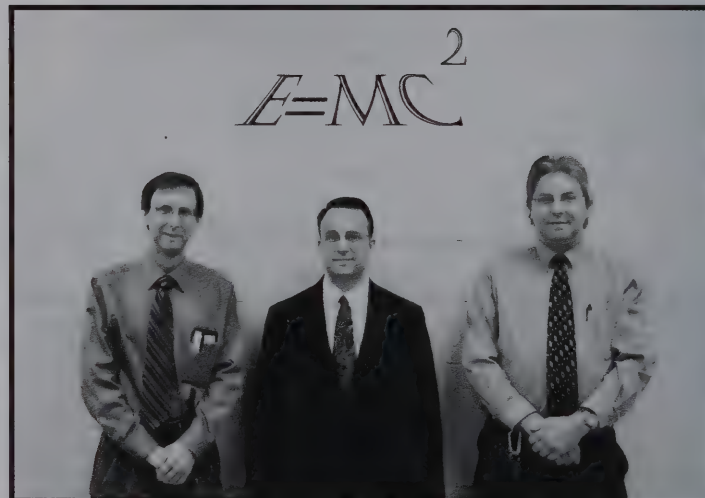

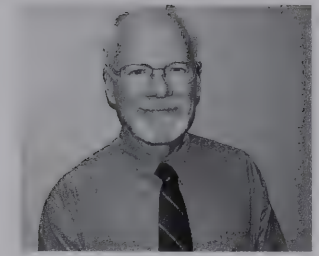

history

What was your vision for yourself when first starting college?

My vision was to learn what I could in a number of areas: religion, language, history, and English in particular. I was preparing for the ministry, but was too interested in these other areas to concentrate on theology alone. That diversity and versatility has paid off in subsequent teaching assignments. I had a goal of a 4.0 average; I knew I had ability in the academic area, but the accomplishment of my goal was not without very hard work in studying every night until about 1:00 am – except for Fridays when I got with my friends. The future was uncertain. I did want to enjoy myself as well as learn, and I did accomplish that. College was a great experience for me.

Where are you today?

B.A. in English and history from Drury College (now Drury University) in Springfield, MO., M.A. in history from Wichita State University, Ph.D. in history from the University of Kansas. I have been involved in Christian ministry all my life until just recently. I have lectured for various groups and schools in Nashville. I am a car host for the Tennessee Central Railway Museum in Nashville. I also teach regularly for Lipscomb's Life-Long Learning program and have taught in our Hostel program. My wife and I have sponsored three Lipscomb in Vienna programs and are scheduled for the fourth in the fall. We also sponsored the Lipscomb in London program in 2001. I also organized a number of European study programs on my own involving Lipscomb students and parents.

What is your vision for the future of Lipscomb University?

My vision is that Lipscomb, under Dr. Lowry's direction, will achieve standing as an internationally-recognized, high quality educational institution. I can see definite progress in that direction as new programs are added and community services offered that have gained both recognition and praise for Lipscomb in this community. Our faculty has a well-deserved reputation for excellent that is only enhanced by the addition of new centers and programs. I would like to see a quality liberal arts program remain as the center-piece of our academic offerings and qualified full-time faculty continually added. In short, my vision for Lipscomb's future is very positive.

Tell us a story.

I would say that, as I look back over twenty-five years, the highlights of teaching at Lipscomb has been the wonderful relationships with members of our department, and my relationships with students, many of which have become enduring friendships. What has been especially rewarding is to work with a student for four or five years and see the development of his/her understanding until it reaches a culmination in an integration of material into a cohesive whole. That is an exciting experience for the student and most rewarding for me. Of course, the many times I have helped students experience the history and culture of Europe over the years has been especially memorable, and the greatest of all those experiences has been the Vienna programs. On the humorous side, students who went along on a trip I organized in 1992 involving an excursion from Granada in Spain to Morocco in north Africa would tell you about how they set me up to dance with a belly-dancer in Tangier. Or they might tell you about the time I drank two cups of Starbucks coffee and the caffeine had a strange effect on me so that I lost inhibitions and said all kinds of strange things in class. (And it was only coffee; I am quite sure). My most embarrassing moment had to be the time, after giving my usual instructions to students about attending every class and being on time that I forgot about a class. I was in the middle of a meeting, I think on the study abroad program – I remember Mrs. Cates being there – when I remembered the class. I was about twenty minutes late, but they had all waited. Some talked about leaving, but others convinced them I would be there. A close second, also involving Mrs. Cates, was when I was assigned room 118 in Swang and when I found another class and teacher there, I was convinced Mrs. Cates had assigned two classes to the same room. She came rushing over to resolve the program, and to my great embarrassment I realized I had looked in the wrong room and forgotten that 118 is down the hall from where I thought it was.

What was your vision for yourself when first starting college?

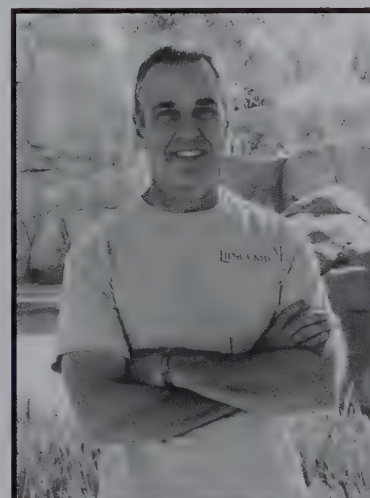
What is your vision for the future of Lipscomb University?

I see the university placing more of an emphasis on research and service, as well as a more global awareness. I am excited about the development of the institutes and centers that reach students who may not be seeking degrees, but information and/or skills. I personally want to initiate a Center for Family Wellness, which will help train people to work with others to strengthen families in our culture.

Tell us a story.

It has been interesting to see my professional interests unfold. Much of this "unfolding" has been a result of questions students have asked me. Several years ago, a student came by my office and wanted me to be a part of a program called "Conversations." The theme of that program that year was "Society, Suffering, and Solutions." The student asked me to address this topic by asking me, "What are the social consequences of family breakdown?" We had been sponsoring the Conference on Family Wellness for a few years, but this allowed us to bring in some nationally recognized researchers and writers to address this question. That put us on the map, so to speak, and other prominent guests were willing to come to campus after that.

Another question from a student that really changed my professional interests was when a student asked me in class, "Dr. Conger, is there such a thing as a long term, happy marriage? Because I've seen long-term marriages, and I've seen happy marriages, but I've never seen both in the same marriage." That stunned me, and I realized that we were in serious trouble in our culture. Since then, I became more dedicated to not only strengthening marriages, but also helping people understand the importance of strong marriages and families to society, as well as individuals.







We have spent a lot of space discussing the collective vision for the future. What about plans for the individual?

The Chapel Office:

The chapel program has undergone many changes in the past few years. This year chapel is held every Tuesday and Thursday morning, with students required to obtain thirty chapel credits, one per session. Tuesday chapel is held in Allen Arena and is a time for the whole school to come together to worship and hear speakers. Thursday chapels are held in smaller groups throughout campus. Students may choose to attend praise and worship in Alumni Auditorium, experiential worship in Ward Hall, or prayer chapel in Ezell Chapel. Students may also obtain up to five credits from mission trips or service projects. *Campus Minister: Brandon Steele*

The Career Development Center:

The Career Development Center offers students and alumni a continually updated database of part-time and full-time jobs and internships. The staff will help with resume writing, job search, and interview skills. Internships for credit are coordinated through the career center, and they frequently hold events such as career fairs to help students find these internships and other jobs. The Career Development Center also hosts Career Cafe after chapel. Here students can get an in depth look at a different career each session and talk to alumni working in that field. *Director: Monica Wentworth*

The Counseling Center:

The Counseling Center offers full range counseling services to Lipscomb students and employees. Services are provided by licensed professional counselors and marital and family therapists. Testing services are also available through the counseling center. Here students may take tests such as the ACT, SAT, or class CLEP. Practice tests are available as well. *Director: Dr. Paul Cates*

Health Services:

This year the Health Services center has added a nurse practitioner to the staff. Students may visit to receive a physical or for in depth illness treatment. The nurse practitioner can prescribe and treat many illnesses that would require a doctor's visit. A regular nurse is also available for first-aid and health advice. The Health Services center recommends and coordinates flu shots for students each year. *Director: Bethany Massey, F.N.P.*

Beaman Library:

The Beaman Library offers a wide range of useful services to students. In addition to the many books available to check out, the library offers computers, copiers, and study rooms that are constantly used by students. The library staff are happy to help students find exactly what they need, and if they don't have it, they will go out of their way to get it. *Director: Carolyn Wilson*

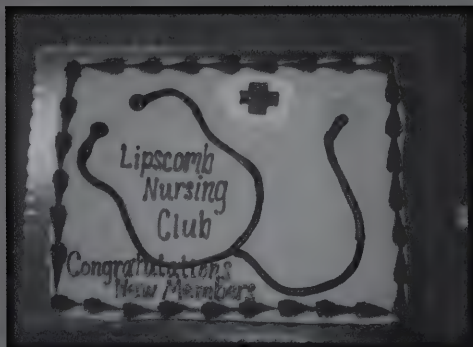

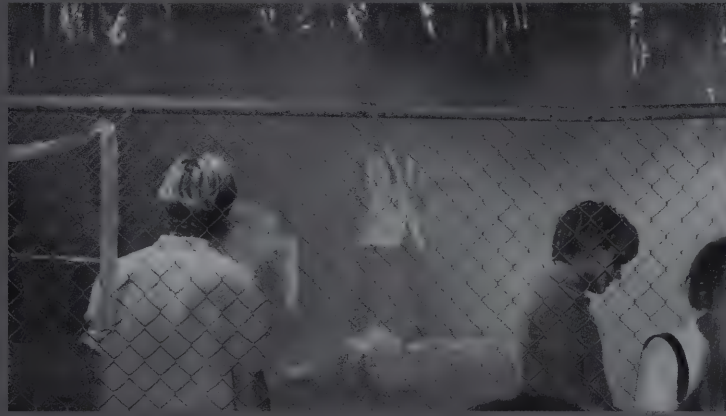
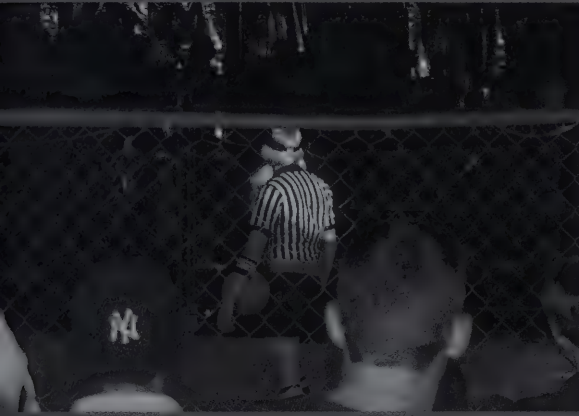
Home Run Derby - September 1

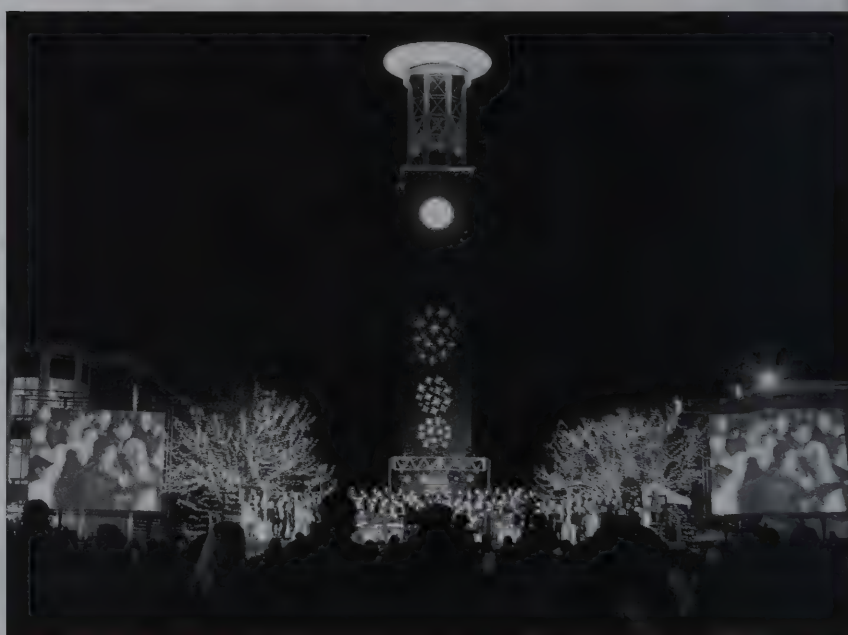

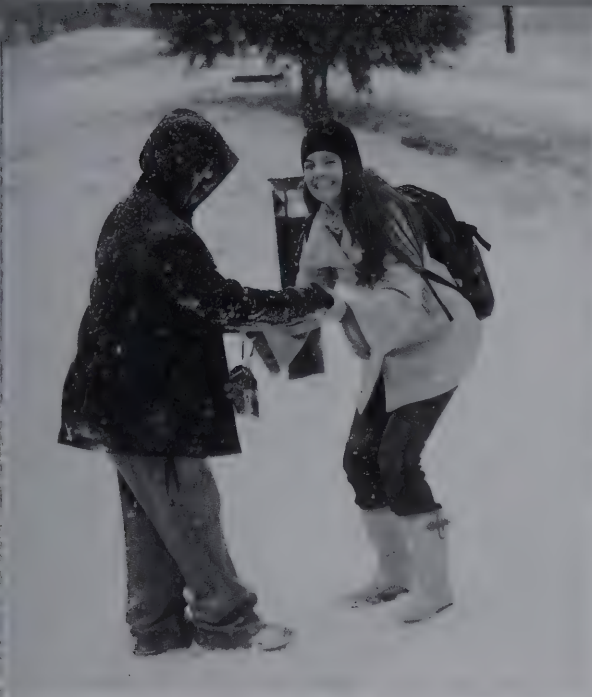


Lighting of the Green - December 1

A total of thirty-nine people including pre-med students (who gain practical experience), Spanish students (who are invaluable as translators), doctors, pharmacists, and other medical professionals spend a week attending to over 1,500 patients and distributing over 6,000 prescriptions in different clinics, as well as in a nursing home and two orphanages.



Left 3 photos: Honduras Hillsboro spring - The purpose of this trip is to serve the families and church in the Mateo area and to provide spiritual service and Christian bonding opportunities for our University ministry. This trip is primarily construction focused: students built 15 houses during the week.

Above 3 photos: Ghana summer - The Village of Hope in Ghana, West Africa is home to approximately 200 children. The children are brought to the orphanage from off the streets, abusive/dangerous living conditions, and even rescued from child slavery. One of our most important purposes is to love and build long-term relationships with the children, house parents, and staff members of the Village of Hope.





Above 3 photos: Jamaica spring - In the spring of 2001, there were approximately 50 Lipscomb University students on a waiting list to serve the Lord over their spring break. Most of them waited to be contacted, but there was no place for them to go. Many people prayed from that time on for more opportunities to serve and share the gospel over spring break. The Jamaica mission team is a direct result of these prayers.

1ST 100 DAYS

ONCE INAUGURATED. President Barack Obama got down to business, signing executive orders banning harsh interrogation techniques of suspected terrorists on his second day in office. The ban was Obama's first step toward closing the prisons at Guantanamo Bay. **ONE WEEK LATER,** the president signed a labor act guaranteeing equal pay for all workers. Regarding the act, Obama explained that he saw the inequality as a family issue, not just a women's issue. **ATTENTION TO THE ECONOMY** brought the \$787 billion economic stimulus package in the form of February's American Recovery

and Reinvestment Act, controversial legislation which the administration claimed sparked growth as early as the third quarter.

A TOTAL TROOP WITHDRAWAL from Iraq by the end of 2011 was announced on February 27, and just a month later Obama announced a renewed commitment to Afghanistan and plans to send an additional 21,000 new troops there. **LONDON'S G-20 SUMMIT** allowed leaders from nations worldwide, as well as regional groups and international institutions, to strategize ways to revive the global economy and stimulate growth.



SOMALI PIRATES hijacked an American ship in the Indian Ocean off the Horn of Africa and took Captain Richard Phillips hostage in April. The ship, the Maersk Alabama, was carrying food and other aid supplies for the World Food Program. The five-day ordeal ended when U.S. Navy SEAL snipers killed three pirates, freeing Phillips. **BEA ARTHUR**, two-time Emmy award winner, died of cancer at 86. Probably best known for her *Golden Girls* character Dorothy Zbornak, Arthur began her acting career on Broadway, winning a Tony in the original stage production of *Mame*. **A 50 TO 1 LONGSHOT** won the 135th Kentucky Derby. Jockey Calvin Borel and Mine That Bird came from behind on a muddy track to win the race by nearly seven lengths. **VOCALIST SUSAN BOYLE** became an overnight sensation on *Britain's Got Talent*. Her performance quickly became one of the most watched videos on YouTube. Despite a second-place finish in the competition, Boyle's first album, *I Dreamed a Dream*, became the biggest-selling album in the world for 2009 in just six weeks. **NORTH CAROLINA'S TARHEELS** beat Michigan State 89-72 in the men's Final Four, avenging a title game loss to Kansas the previous season. With the help of upperclassmen Tyler Hansbrough, Wayne Ellington, Ty Lawson and Danny Green, all of whom opted to return for another year with coach Roy Williams rather than heading to the NBA, the Tarheels cruised to their fifth national title and their second in five years. A unanimous pre-season No. 1, the team was UNC's first since 1982 to start and finish the year in the nation's top spot. **CONFICKER WORM**, a computer virus that targeted the Microsoft Windows operating system, was estimated to have infected more than 15 million computers. It was believed to be the worst computer virus since the SQL slammer worm in 2003. In February 2009, Microsoft offered a \$250,000 reward for help with finding and arresting the people who created the computer worm.

31 Nearly 40 unemployed New Yorkers took part in the Unemployment Olympics, a day of fun and games in Manhattan's East Village planned by a recently laid-off computer software worker.

7 The Connecticut women's basketball team won its sixth national title, defeating Louisville 76-54 in a St. Louis Final Four tagged "March to the Arch."

12 Argentinian golfer Ángel Cabrera won the Masters at 12 under par after a three-way playoff against Americans Chad Campbell and Kenny Perry.

23 Apple's iTunes App Store knew in advance that some lucky buyer would download the company's one billionth app on this date and they offered prizes galore.



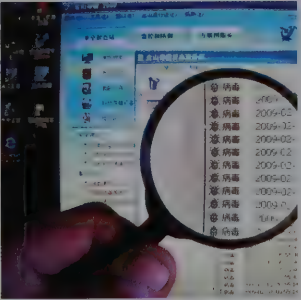

BERNIE MADOFF was sentenced to 150 years in prison for the multibillion-dollar Ponzi scheme he perpetrated as a wealth management advisor. He pleaded guilty to 11 felonies, including securities fraud, money laundering, perjury, making false filings with the SEC and theft from an employee benefit plan. In addition to his imprisonment, the former chair of the NASDAQ stock market was ordered to forfeit \$170 billion. **U.S. WITHDRAWAL FROM IRAQ** was celebrated as a national holiday when Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki declared June 30 "National Sovereignty Day." In accordance with agreements with Iraq, American troops completed their withdrawal from Iraqi cities and transferred the responsibility of securing the cities to Iraqi troops. **IRANIAN ELECTION PROTESTS** lasted months and resulted in at least 36 confirmed deaths after it was announced that President Mahmoud Ahmadinejad had won re-election with nearly 63% of the vote. Results were later certified and Ahmadinejad was sworn in for a second term in office on August 5. **SERENA WILLIAMS** beat her sister, Venus, in the final match at Wimbledon to win her third Grand Slam victory of the year. Then the sisters paired to beat Aussies Samantha Stosur and Rennae Stubbs, winning the doubles title the same day. **HULU**, a free app that allowed viewers to watch television shows on the web, gained traction. Some studies showed as many as 45% of all teens watched "TV" on the internet. **AL FRANKEN**, a former Saturday Night Live comedian and satirist, finally won his seat in the Senate after the Minnesota Supreme Court rejected incumbent Norm Coleman's myriad challenges. The final recount gave Franken the victory by 312 votes. **NBA CHAMPION L.A. LAKERS** won their 15th title on June 14, defeating the Orlando Magic 99-86 to clinch the title in just five games. Lakers star Kobe Bryant was named M.V.P. after scoring 30 points in the final game and 162 in the series.


THE BREAKING NEWS of Michael Jackson's cardiac arrest and sudden death on June 25 dominated the internet causing unprecedented spikes in traffic and overwhelming social networks such as Facebook and Twitter. **TOPPING THE CHARTS** with 17 No. 1 hits (including four as a member of the Jackson 5), Jackson's 1982 *Thriller* remained the best-selling album ever. In the two weeks following his death, buyers snapped up another 2.3 million Jackson albums. In all, his world sales of more than 750 million records made him one of the best-selling recording artists ever.

JACKSON IS CREDITED with elevating the music video into an art form. His videos for "Billie Jean," "Beat It" and "Thriller" brought a strong crossover following to MTV. He popularized the moonwalk and the robot and influenced generations of dancers. **KNOWN AS THE KING OF POP**, Jackson was inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame both as a Jackson and as a solo artist. **FINAL GOODBYES** were televised from L.A.'s Staples Center where Stevie Wonder, Lionel Richie, Mariah Carey, John Mayer, Jennifer Hudson and Usher performed at his memorial service as millions worldwide watched.

6 A ceremony marking the 64th anniversary of the Hiroshima and Nagasaki atomic bombings, Mayor of Hiroshima Tadaoshi Akiba supported U.S. President Barack Obama's call for the abolition of nuclear weapons.



8 Crews recovered all nine bodies after a small plane and a helicopter collided over the Hudson River in New York, sending both crafts spiraling from the clear, blue sky.



Two newly discovered works by Mozart — a prelude and a concerto movement — were performed in Salzburg, Austria, Mozart's birthplace.

Reading Rainbow, the third longest-running children's show on United States public-service television network PBS, ended its 26-year run.

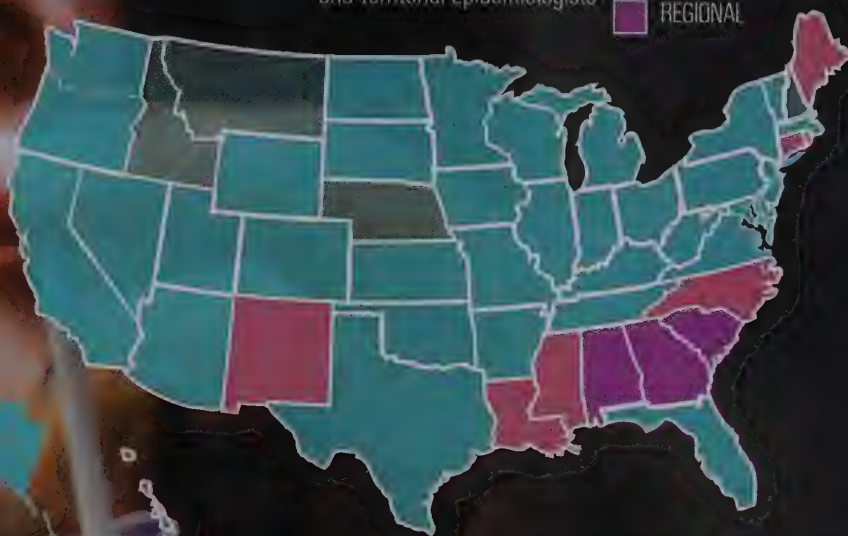
U.S. JOURNALISTS FREED following nearly five months of detainment in North Korea were escorted home by former president Bill Clinton after he met with North Korean Dictator Kim Jong Il. Laura Ling and Euna Lee, reporters for Current TV, a media venture owned by Al Gore, had been charged with entering the country illegally to conduct a smear campaign. **KILLER WHALE RESEARCH** identified new behavior in large groups of orcas. A *Journal of Ethology* report cited groups of whales gathering in British Columbia, Alaska, Iceland and Antarctica to form "clubs." While whales often live in pods of 10-20, scientists say the newly observed clubs of as many as 100 seem to allow the whales to form and maintain social ties. **SENATOR TED KENNEDY** of Massachusetts, the last surviving Kennedy brother, died at age 77 after battling brain cancer. In his 46 years as a senator, Kennedy championed labor, health care, civil rights, education and voting rights. President Barack Obama delivered the eulogy at Kennedy's August 29 funeral in Boston. In addition to the family, Vice President Joe Biden, Secretary of State Hillary Clinton, former Presidents Bill Clinton, George W. Bush and Jimmy Carter, and First Lady Michelle Obama also attended. Kennedy was buried at Arlington National Cemetery next to his brothers, President John F. Kennedy and Senator Robert F. Kennedy. **A WEB ATTACK** targeted at a specific pro-Georgian blogger incapacitated Twitter for two hours on August 6. Twitter and other social networks like Facebook and LiveJournal were overwhelmed by denial-of-service attacks disrupting access to more than 300 million users. Botnets — thousands of infected home and workplace PCs — flooded the web with nuisance requests, cutting off access to anyone else. Twitter, the micro-blogging site where users post 140-character messages to their followers — soared in popularity in 2009. According to comScore, a Web tracking firm, the site had 44 million unique visitors in the month of June. **SUPREME COURT JUSTICE** Sonia Sotomayor was confirmed by the Senate as Associate Justice of the U.S. Supreme Court, replacing David Souter who retired in June. Sotomayor, who rose from the housing projects of the Bronx to the top of the legal profession by way of Princeton and Yale Law, made history as the nation's third female and first Hispanic Supreme Court justice.

FLUSHOTS

FLU SHOT CLINICS were set up in workplaces and schools from coast to coast as the government and the CDC suggested that as many people as possible be vaccinated against the H1N1 virus that led to hundreds of school closings in the spring of 2009. **AN EARLY START** to the flu season meant victims were affected in higher numbers and more extremely than usual, and that the flu's peak activity came in late October and early November rather than March. Until the vaccine arrived, anyone with H1N1's potential respiratory symptoms was encouraged to stay home rather than infecting classmates or

co-workers. **IN OCTOBER**, the vaccine began arriving in both injected and nasal spray forms. Within four months, 97 million H1N1 vaccine doses had been given to 86 million people in the United States. **TRULY PANDEMIC**, the H1N1 influenza infected approximately 57 million Americans or slightly more than 18 percent of the population between April 2009 and February 2010. About 11,690 people died and nearly 260,000 were hospitalized from the viral infection, which was also known as swine flu. **THE THREAT** of an additional outbreak loomed as the annual flu season waned.

ECONOMIC WOES

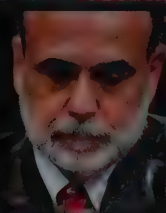
JOB MARKET DETERIORATION continued, despite some tentative indications that the economy was improving. The federal unemployment rate peaked at 10.1% in October, but the economy continued to shed jobs at the rate of more than 263,000 a month. Data showed a loss of 8.4 million jobs since the recession's start in December 2007. **THE UNDEREMPLOYMENT RATE** of workers whose hours had been cut or who were working part-time for lack of full-time positions hit 17% — the highest

since they began tracking the category in 1994. **FORECLOSURE FILINGS** in the third quarter hit a record high. Despite government-led and lender-supported relief efforts, nearly a million U.S. homes — 1 in every 136 nationwide — were in foreclosure by October. **FEDERAL RESERVE CHAIRMAN** Ben Bernanke announced September 15 that the recession had "very likely ended" while warning that it may not quickly affect the unemployment rate.

MTV'S 2009 VIDEO MUSIC AWARDS were going to be different from the start. In addition to recognizing current work, anticipation of a Michael Jackson tribute ran high. Instead, Kanye West literally stole the show, grabbing the mic during 20-year-old country/pop star Taylor Swift's Best-Female Video acceptance speech for a quick rant about Beyoncé Knowles being more deserving. Swift went on to win the Grammy for Album of the Year for her second album, *Fearless*. **ACTOR PATRICK SWAYZE** died at age 57, after suffering from pancreatic cancer for nearly two years. Of his more than 30 movies, he was best-known for his roles as romantic leading men in the films *Dirty Dancing* and *Ghost*. **A GIANT MYLAR BALLOON** took off from a family's yard in northern Colorado, and nationwide panic erupted when it was reported that the six-year-old son might be aboard the 20-foot-long, saucer-shaped helium flyer. A runway at the Denver airport was shut down and search and rescue crews scoured the area below the craft's 50-mile flight path for the child, who was later found hiding in the garage. Subsequent interviews revealed that the event had been planned. The couple was billed for search services and both parents were sentenced to jail time. **THE WORLD'S TALLEST BUILDING**, the Burj Khalifa in Dubai, U.A.E. was completed on October 1 and opened on January 5, 2010. Named after the leader of neighboring oil-rich Abu Dhabi, which contributed billions of dollars to keep Dubai afloat, the building housed a hotel, offices and luxury apartments. At 2,717 feet, the tower with a public observation deck on the 124th floor was the tallest man-made structure ever built. **"BEATLES DAY"** was celebrated worldwide on 09/09/09 when re-mastered versions of The Beatles' albums were released, on the same day the video game *The Beatles: Rock Band* was released. In the major music markets of North America, Japan and the UK, consumers purchased more than 2.25 million copies of re-mastered albums in the first five days of release. In addition, more than half a million *Rock Band* units sold during the game's first month of release. Incorporating many of the gameplay features of the *Rock Band* series, the game included 45 songs by the popular British rock group.

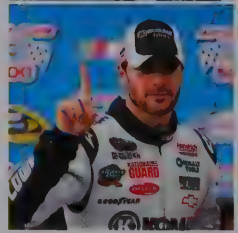
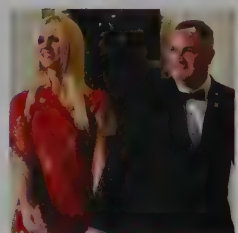
TWILIGHT: NEW MOON

The second movie in the Twilight saga, *New Moon*, follows the vampire Edward Cullen as he struggles to cope with the loss of his lover, Bella. The film also features the return of the werewolf Jacob to the U.S. for 2009. *Twilight: New Moon* is the most successful film in the series, grossing over \$370 million worldwide.



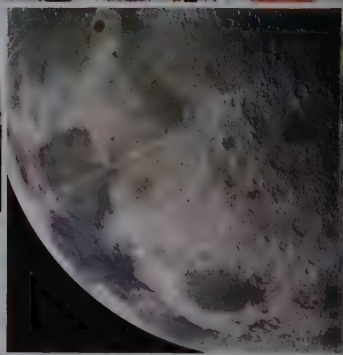
A YANKEES WORLD SERIES WIN gave the team its 27th championship with a 7-3 victory over the Phillies in Game 6. Hideki Matsui, the first Japanese-born player to be named a Series M.V.P., led the Yankees' offense with six runs batted in off a homer, a single and a double. The last Yankees' title was in 2000. **THE FIRST STATE DINNER** hosted by President and Mrs. Obama toasted a growing U.S. friendship with India with an evening of regal pageantry on the White House South Lawn on November 24. Visiting Indian Prime Minister Manmohan Singh and his wife Gursharan Kaur were honored guests alongside 300 others. A tradition dating back to 1874, state dinners were the most treasured and formal honor a U.S. president could offer a foreign dignitary, and the most coveted invitation in Washington. Unbeknownst to the Obamas and to the Secret Service, a Virginia couple, Tareq and Michaele Salahi, entered the dinner without an invitation, bypassing all security checkpoints. **SHOOTINGS AT FORT HOOD** killed 13 and injured 30 on November 5. Major Nidal Malik Hasan opened fire on fellow soldiers at the Fort Hood U.S. Army base in Texas; some reports suggested he was unhappy about an upcoming deployment. **NASCAR'S LONGEST STREAK** of consecutive series championships belonged to Jimmie Johnson, who surpassed Cale Yarbrough when he clinched his fourth title in a row, winning seven races in back-to-back seasons. **OPRAH'S PLANS** to retire when her current contract expires were announced nearly two years in advance of her final show. Media mogul/talk show host/philanthropist Oprah Winfrey said she will end her daily talk show in 2011. The show, which attracted more than seven million viewers a day, had been on the air since 1984. **SIGNS OF WATER ON THE MOON** were confirmed without question in November when a satellite intentionally crashed into a crater near the moon's South Pole. Using a two-part satellite, scientists said they created a collision, then measured the debris it created. The discovery was good news for explorers who wanted to set up labs on the lunar surface and to the scientists who hoped that the water, in the form of ancient ice, would reveal information about the history of the solar system.



Royal Caribbean cruise ship MS *Oasis of the Seas* was officially unveiled at Fort Lauderdale, Florida. At 225,282 gross tons, it was the world's largest passenger vessel.

Europe's Large Hadron Collider, which restarted November 20 after a 14-month repair, set a new world record for particle accelerations.

Ceremonies in India marked the first anniversary of a series of attacks in Mumbai by Pakistani militants which killed 174 people.



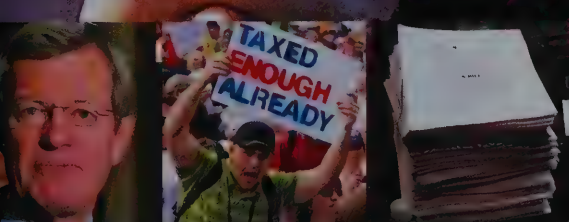

HEALTHCARE

HEALTH CARE REFORM was a priority for President Obama and the Democratic leaders of Congress. In November, they came close to creating a comprehensive system of national health insurance when the House approved an overhaul of the system, 220 votes to 215. **MAX BAUCUS**, Senate Finance Committee chairman, had presented a plan that included many new insurance industry regulations but no government-run health care. The Democrat from Montana believed his bill could bring together Republicans and Democrats for an ambitious overhaul of health care. **TEA PARTY**

PROTESTS sprung up from coast to coast, providing a platform for citizens wishing to speak their discontent. While groups of those who felt they could no longer sit still and quietly observe governmental changes that made them uncomfortable took on many traits, the newly empowered activists worked to be visible in many parts of the country. **SENATE VOTES** in November were followed by the Senate's approval of an \$871 billion bill in December. While the two Congressional branches worked to reconcile their bills, it became apparent agreement was not imminent; the debate would continue for months.

HAITIAN EARTHQUAKE

DEATH AND DESTRUCTION were apparent immediately following the temblor which struck near Port-au-Prince, the capital city of Haiti. While fatality estimates topped 200,000, officials conceded that the burial of uncounted corpses would prohibit an exact tally. The quake, which was "felt strongly" in Cuba more than 200 miles away, damaged thousands of homes, including the president's residence. **BUSH/CLINTON HAITI RELIEF FUND**, designed to demonstrate American unity, raised more than \$17 million in under two weeks. In the month following the quake, American

charities sent more than \$790 million in charitable aid. **WYCLEF JEAN, GEORGE CLOONEY & FRIENDS** hosted concerts in New York, Los Angeles and London to raise funds for earthquake victims. Called "Hope for Haiti Now: A Global Benefit for Earthquake Relief," the January 22 concerts included performances by Bruce Springsteen, Madonna, Mary J. Blige, Taylor Swift, Justin Timberlake, Coldplay and Bono. In addition, a remake of the 25-year-old anthem "We Are the World," featuring more than 70 big names representing all genres of music, was recorded to benefit Haitian aid groups.



JAMES CAMERON'S AVATAR broke all kinds of records en route to becoming the highest grossing film of all time. Development of the science fiction epic spanned 15 years, partially because Cameron had previously determined that the necessary technology was not yet available to portray his visions for the film. Released for both traditional two-dimension projection and 3-D, *Avatar* was also the first film ever to gross \$2 billion, and it was nominated for nine Academy Awards, including Best Picture and Best Director. **TIGER WOODS** was named the Associated Press Athlete of the Decade in December. Despite a personal scandal that led to an indefinite break from professional golf, he collected nearly as many votes as runners-up Lance Armstrong and Roger Federer combined. Woods won 64 tournaments including 12 majors and earned more than \$81 million during the decade. **A TERRORIST ATTACK** on a December 25 Northwest Airlines flight from Amsterdam to Detroit was thwarted after a student with suspected al-Qaida ties attempted to ignite explosives in flight. **FIFA WORLD CUP SOCCER** tickets went on sale globally, adding more than 1 million new seats to those nearly 700,000 tickets already sold for the June/July soccer matches in South Africa. **CONAN O'BRIEN** left NBC and *The Tonight Show* on January 22, just eight months after he took the reins from Jay Leno. Despite ongoing unsuccessful negotiations with the network, O'Brien planned a busy last week hosting Robin Williams, Barry Manilow, Tom Hanks and Will Ferrell, and he took to the stage playing 70s rock anthem "Free Bird" with the band during the closing credits of his final show. **THE U.S. HEALTH CARE REFORM BILL** passed by the Senate on December 24 was expected to extend insurance coverage to 30 million additional Americans. Following the January 27 State of the Union Address where Obama vowed not to "walk away from" his drive for health insurance reform, additional modifications were made to the White House's proposed health care plan in preparation for a February 25 televised bipartisan health care summit. The six-hour summit was covered on C-SPAN and was the day's news focus.

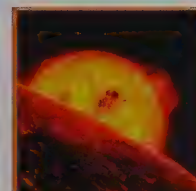

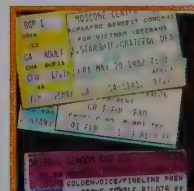

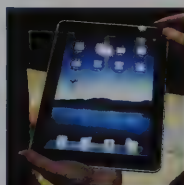

SNOW BLANKETED THE NATION, encompassing all 50 states on February 13 after a dusting on the Florida panhandle. Hawaii did not receive new snow, but had a base at the peaks of the state's highest volcanoes. Record snowfall affected many parts of the country this winter, from the Midwest where 50-year-old records for most days with 4" or more of snow cover were smashed by more than five weeks, to the mid-Atlantic states where record snowfalls from December to February broke 100-year-old seasonal snowfall records the first week in February. **BEYONCÉ WON SIX GRAMMYS**, including Song of the Year for "Single Ladies (Put a Ring on It)," and became the first woman to win six awards in the same night. Only Michael Jackson (1984) and Carlos Santana (2000) had won more awards in a single year. **APPLE'S IPAD RELEASED** on January 27 to mixed reviews. The new "digital tablet" brings Apple's sleek design and functionality to the masses for an affordable price. Weighing just 1.5 pounds, the iPad is lighter than a laptop, but users will be able to browse the web, access email, watch movies, read books and more. In addition, Apple created 12 innovative new apps for the iPad, which will also run almost all of the more than 140,000 apps available in the App Store. **BRITAIN'S UFO FILES**, made public to civilians in January, totalled more than 6,000 pages detailing sightings from 1994 - 2000. The fifth (and largest) release ever was intended to make access available to a wider audience. **MOBILE CARRIERS JOIN FORCES** to rival Apple's App Store. AT&T, China Mobile, China Unicom, Sprint and Verizon were among the first companies to unite, creating a centralized location for apps for a variety of mobile devices possible because of cross-platform development. The Wholesale Applications Community will represent more than three billion customers worldwide. **OLYMPIC SKIER BODE MILLER** won three more medals at the 2010 Winter Olympics (super combined gold, Super G silver and downhill bronze) bringing the four-time World Champion's record Olympic tally to five. **SUPER BOWL XLIV**, the most-watched Super Bowl and the most-viewed program in television history, saw the New Orleans Saints defeat Peyton Manning and the Indianapolis Colts, 31-17. The Saints, who became just the fourth team ever to win in their first Super Bowl appearance, won with a key defensive play on an interception by defensive back Tracy Porter, and a nearly perfect offensive game by QB Drew Brees.

WINTER OLYMPICS

PRE-OPENING TRAGEDY struck the games during a practice session on February 12 when 21-year-old Nodar Kumaritashvili, representing the Republic of Georgia in the luge, lost control of his sled and died. **VANCOUVER, BRITISH COLUMBIA** hosted the 2010 Winter Games, bringing the competition to Canada for just the second time since its inception in 1924. Nearly 2,650 athletes from 82 nations competed in 15 sports and 89 separate medal events. **SPEEDSKATER APOLO ANTON OHNO** added three new medals to his previous five Olympic medals from Salt Lake City and Turin. Ohno broke

Bonnie Blair's record, becoming the most decorated American Winter Olympian ever. **TWO-TIME WORLD CUP CHAMPION LINDSEY VONN** became the first American female to win Olympic downhill gold. Vonn skied all five of her scheduled events with a bruised shin, medaling in two. **SNOWBOARDER SHAUN WHITE** defended his Olympic gold in the halfpipe with a first run so strong he secured his victory. In a celebratory second run, he debuted a Double McTwist 1260 (which he named The Tomahawk). The new trick contributed to a record score of 48.4, increasing his margin of victory by 1.6 points.

TILIKUM THE ORCA was not in the pool when SeaWorld Orlando's show, *Believe: The Sensational Shamu Show*, reopened just three days after the six-ton orca attacked and drowned veteran trainer Dawn Brancheau on February 24. The show featured trainers using hand signals to instruct the whales to leap, twirl and wave to or splash the audience. **AN OVERTIME VICTORY** in hockey gave Canada the Olympic gold the host nation craved on the last day of Winter Games. The 3-2 win over Team U.S.A. came 7:40 into the extra period when 22-year-old Sidney Crosby sent goalie Ryan Miller a surprise wrist shot. Miller was the series M.V.P. and Crosby, a native of Nova Scotia, became the youngest ever captain of a Stanley Cup-winning team in 2009, when his Pittsburgh Penguins beat the Detroit Red Wings four games to three. **CANADA'S JOANNIE ROCHETTE** captured viewers' hearts, competing in women's figure skating after her mother succumbed to a heart attack in Vancouver just days before. The 24-year-old from Quebec took bronze and became one of the most personal stories of the Vancouver Games. Korea's Yu-Na Kim became her country's first-ever Olympic figure skating medalist when she broke the 200-point mark and captured the gold medal. **AN ICEBERG COLLISION WITH ANTARCTICA** dislodged another massive block of ice from the continent in February. The original iceberg, known as B9B, measured 60 miles in length and had broken free from Antarctica more than 20 years ago. The new iceberg weighed in at roughly 700 billion tons and, at 48 x 24 miles, contained the equivalent of one fifth of the world's annual total water usage. The two icebergs drifted together off the east coast of Antarctica. **U.S. BOBSLED GOLD** ended a 62-year Olympic drought for America when two-time World Champion Night Train pilot Steve Holcomb with crew Justin Olsen and Steve Mesler and brakeman Curtis Tomasevicz dominated action in Whistler. The win meant Germany's Andre Lange, who took gold in the two-man race, failed in his attempt to capture five Olympic golds in as many attempts. **AN 8.8 EARTHQUAKE IN CHILE** on February 27 toppled buildings, left more than 300 dead and caused tsunami evacuations as far away as Hawaii and Japan. While the quake was significantly more powerful than the Haitian temblor that caused massive devastation in January, the damage was minimized by its relatively deep epicenter and strict Chilean building codes that followed massive damage caused by a huge quake in 1960.
