




Gary Fulks Professor of Business Administration 28 years

Linda Roberson Professor of Biology 31 years

Linda Roberson has taught for almost 32 years in the Biology Department and is an outstanding teacher and mentor. She has helped develop an outstanding and high quality pre-med program at Lipscomb. Over her years of service, she has served on numerous faculty committees including serving as chair of the Pre-Med Committee. She has been the faculty advisor to the Pre-Med Club and has been a mentor to literally hundreds of students. Honors include receiving two Outstanding Teacher of the Year Awards, the Baker Summer Research Award, an Outstanding Advisory of the Year award.



Douglas Morris Associate Professor of English 30 years

The Landiss Lecture Series had a riveting year with appearances by both Constance Fulmer and Suzanne Marrs. Morris P. Landiss, for whom the Lecture Series is named, taught Dr. Constance Fulmer, professor at Pepperdine University and Edith Simcox scholar. Fulmer's presentation marked a special time for the lecture series since she was the last of Dr. Landiss' students to present. Also, her research, conducted at the Bodleian Library, made new insights into 18th century British literature.

Suzanne Marrs, long-time Eudora Welty friend and scholar, presented her revolutionary biography of Welty. Marrs examined unpublished letters, only recently released by the Welty estate. Marrs found that the author's life had been vastly misrepresented. Welty, argued Marrs, was a cosmopolitan and a political activist. Dr. Dana Chamblee-Carpenter introduced Marrs while Michael Kreyling, nationally renowned Welty scholar, attended.









When I volunteered to accompany a student group to the Katrina Relief effort, I intended to cover the event for our campus publications. I expected to "get my hands dirty" a little bit, but thought I was mostly going to "work." I was very surprised at how much I personally gained from this trip. I gained a better appreciation for our students while watching them work tirelessly — for 12 and 13 hour days, sometimes in the pouring rain — to help make life a little better for those folks. It made me very proud to be a part of Lipscomb and reminded me of why I choose to work here.

I also learned a valuable life lesson. Most of our job was helping clean up houses and yards from the debris, which was strewn everywhere. As I hauled load after load of destroyed dishes, clothes, books, and toys--among other things--I realized how fleeting "stuff" is. I was dragging people's lives to the curb for the garbage truck to haul away. Years of stuff was destroyed and put on the curb for the garbage just like that. Yet, the people we helped were just happy to be alive. It was an extremely important lesson for me not to get so caught up in all the "stuff" that I have. It actually inspired me to go home and get rid of a lot of my own junk. It has also made me not be as attached to material things. Hurricane Katrina Relief was an unforgettable experience.



The First Lady's Perspective:

When we inaugurated Dr. Randy Lowry as president, Lipscomb University received a wonderful fringe benefit - Rhonda Lowry. With her wit, intelligence, and energy, Rhonda Lowry promises to be an influential presence in the Lipscomb community. But who is our new first lady? Mrs. Lowry uses the ocean to express the essence of her life. "[In a wave.] there is a lot of rising, a lot of falling, a lot of pulling from above, a lot of settling in the water. . . .There is also a lot of constant motion and force. I would hope that my life would reflect a sense of power, a sense of constancy, and continual movement within guidelines."

Just as a wave goes through transitions, Mrs. Lowry, herself, has experienced many changes which have shaped and formed her perspectives and her faith. Rhonda Lowry went to Pepperdine University after growing up on a Missouri farm. She planned to study church instrumental music with her abilities as a pianist, but found that Pepperdine did not offer a major in church instrumental music. While at Pepperdine she met Randy Lowry. Remembering their first day of friendship, she reflects, "Our first date was to Disneyland... I had four tickets, thinking I am going to college with other students who have never been to Disneyland. I am walking around asking students if they would like to go--all the time Randy is following me.... I thought he doesn't want to go to Disneyland—he has things to do. Finally, I turned around and asked him to go. So he says, I asked him out on our first date."

After completing their degrees, the Lowry's moved from California to Minnesota to Oregon and finally back to California. Even during these transitions, Mrs. Lowry notes, "My passion was always church education. I was always involved where we worshipped." After her youngest child began school, Mrs. Lowry read a flyer from Fuller Theological Seminary which stated, "Are you a woman who has just taken her child to school for the first day? Come to Fuller," and so she did. Rhonda Lowry decided to pursue her Master's of Divinity degree. In addition to being wife and mother, she once again became a student.

Attending Fuller did more that just change Lowry's life: it broadened her perspective of God. Mrs. Lowry notes, "[Fuller]

started as a nondenominational seminary. Their idea was for an evangelical seminary where anyone was welcome to come as long as they professed the Lordship of Jesus Christ and the inspiration of scripture...From there, we discussed everything." This setting afforded her a unique but challenging opportunity. Mrs. Lowry explains, "We had to go to scripture and take off the rose colored glasses of our denominational teaching and ask, 'What is it really saying?' 'What does it mean in the 21st century?,' and 'What am I going to

do about it." This experience represented a

fundamental shift in how Mrs. Lowry viewed scripture: she came to view scripture as a place to look for spiritual transformation rather than merely looking for information.

While developing academically has been a key part of Mrs. Lowry's life, a considerable part of her ministry has always been caring for others. President Lowry recounted a time when his wife, in essence, became a mother to a little boy who spent a year in the Children's Hospital in California. More recently, Mrs. Lowry has cared for her brother, Robert, who has been living with ALS. (Editor's note: Robert died on June 2, 2006.)

For all the transitions that have marked Mrs. Lowry's life, she considers her children, John, Janet, and Melinda as the source of her greatest joy. John graduated from Pepperdine University. He and his wife, Melissa, are expecting their first child this fall. Janet is a Ph.D. student. Her husband Richmond is finishing up his Master's of Education and plans to study law. Melinda studies at Wheaton University, played on the National Championship winning soccer team, and was the spiritual captain of her team.

As Rhonda Lowry assumes her new role as Lipscomb's first lady, she once again will call on her energy, her passion, and her faith to transition into this next phase of service in her life.



Mary Harris was Herff-Jones Representative and Dr. Randy Bouldin was Yearbook Staff advisor.

Each spread was designed with Adobe InDesign CS2. Layouts were created either by staff members using Adobe InDesign CS or were chosen from Herff-Jones predesigned layouts in "Your Layouts." The cover was designed by Lauren Farris, Backlog Editor-in-Chief.

A 1-inch line was used as a border with a 1-inch bar connecting most pictures. Pictures were submitted digitally and no hard copies were used. A 14% white drop shadow was used on pictures. A Cannon EOS Digital Rebel 6.3 Mega Pixels was used for digital pictures, made by the staff. There were 8,467 digital pictures made during the creation of the *Backlog*. Other pictures were taken by members of the Office of Communication and Creative Services of Lipscomb University, J. Christopher's Photography, and university students. Other photographers include Stacey Smith, Aimee Wells, Justin Gregory, Rachel Reed, Lauren Farris, Kyle Gregory, Anthony Estes, Margie Roder, and Karen Long. Copy was done by the *Backlog* staff.

The 2006 Backlog consisted of 224 black pages, with 2 signatures of color. 1,900 copies of the Backlog, Volume 85 were distributed to Lipscomb University Board of Trustees, students, faculty and staff members.
